Indestructible Hope

It may be a symptom of this time of year, but I think hope is an important Biblical principle to look at. We all know about the statistics concerning mental illness. They speak for themselves and say that one in five of us will experience some form of illness, be it anxiety or depression all the way to bipolar and schizophrenia. Alternatively, we may be close to someone who is experiencing mental illness. It is a sad part of our lives, I do not know if we just recognise mental health issues more easily today or if how we live in our society is detrimental to our mental health. It is probably a combination of both. Whatever the answer is, it is not going away and we keep recognising it in our young people at an increasing rate.

Hope must surely be a Biblical principle that can speak into mental pain. So, I think that it is worth reflecting on.

In **Romans 5:1-2** Paul states: "Therefore, since we have been justified through faith, we have peace with God through our Lord Jesus Christ, through whom we have gained access by faith into this grace in which we now stand. And we rejoice in the hope of the glory of God."

These two verses tell of how rejoicing is the result of our faith. If we understand and believe in righteousness by faith in Jesus, that initially gives us peace. And that peace leads to hope in the glory of God – the glory of God being our expectation of heaven, life made new and eternal companionship with God. So spiritual hope gives us joy.

However, verse 3 adds a bit more to the picture – Paul goes on to say "Not only so, but we also rejoice in our sufferings, because we know that suffering produces perseverance; perseverance character; and character, hope." Apparently, spiritual hope is not the end of the picture of our life. What enters into our life that creates problems is suffering. Yet the outcome of suffering is perseverance, improved character and if we have an improved character, it can produce hope.

I think what Paul is saying here is that there are two types of hope, there is spiritual hope in the glory of God, which is joy in waiting for our eternal reward. But he is also saying that in the meantime we live in the description of verse 3, which is the daily 'suffering' in life. That suffering can also lead to hope, but it seems that this hope exists because He *'poured his love into our hearts'*, so it is a here and now hope. For me it is the hope of healing in a daughter, for the ability to be resilient through God's hope in my heart when it is easy to despair. Our hope in our suffering is God's love. His love for us is shown by his willingness to die for us, whilst we were sinners.

Therefore, Paul is giving an understanding of hope that is the logical one of heaven and living beyond the problems of this world. Further on he describes the hope for people suffering right now, as God suffered for us and proved his love. It may not be a logical alleviation or cure for suffering, but it simply says that in case you doubt God because of your suffering – do not forget that God loves you! He has not left you, He has not deserted you, He died for you.

The example of Job's terrible suffering also ties in with Romans. Job is not given an explanation for his suffering, even though the reader is. Why would not God do this? The reasons for Job are those that he would never have guessed and Job is told to trust God. We know that trust in God was right because the narrative of the story tells us, however, it is a metaphor for our own suffering. Only God knows, we have to trust as the entire picture concerning our personal suffering is not always given to us. What gives us hope is knowing that God was acting reasonably with Job, and He was acting with incredible love for us when he died for us.

Maybe these Biblical principles of hope that can help develop resilience. Some people seem to get more than their fair share of suffering, however, God has promised us eternal life. He does not promise us that he will explain or fix our problems right now. Sometimes He just says, '*I love you absolutely, trust that I know what I'm doing.*' Sometimes He says '*Make the best of your situation.*' Can we, can you, rest in the hope that God loves and cares for you? Can you let go of that agonising control, worry and fear? Whether God fixes the problems in this world (and your life) now or later, He will always do what is best. We can be sure of that because he died for us. There is no greater love and compassion than that!

Returning them prior to this date would be fantastic! At this time of the year we aim to ensure that we have everything back, and then ready for another year in 2018.


