

Research tells us that one of the greatest predictors of student success is the frequency and depth of communication between home and school. As home and school work collaboratively to communicate learner expectations, progress, achievement, social skills and personal development; the opportunities for our children to feel secure and cared for, understand the goals of their education, work to achieve their full potential, while building positive attitudes and a relationship with God are significantly increased. Negative Self-Talk

Everyone engages in negative self-talk at some time – you know those phrases such as "I'm not good enough" or "I can't do this". It is really hard to fight against these phrases as an adult – but children also find it hard.

Often I see students who have quite significant negative self-talk and it reminds me that it is better to try and acknowledge this and turn it around than to keep repeating this thinking.

A great article by *'The Reformed Idealist Mum'*, suggests that replacing negative self-talk such as "I can't do this test" with something like "I am nervous about the test but I have studied hard for it", can be really effective. By using what is known as a 'self-fulfilling prophecy' apparently it is enough to influence your behaviour to change.

And as a parent, when your children have said things like "I'm frustrated", "I feel bad about this" or "I'm scared of that" often we respond with positive affirmations like "Don't be frustrated", "Don't feel bad", or "Don't be scared". This is actually not empathizing with our children's emotions. They need to know that we have heard them and allow them to have these feelings because as parents we cannot always fix things.

So what can you say? When your children say "I can't do this!" you say "...yet!"

By adding this simple word, it allows children to hear that they may not be able to do the thing that is troubling them today but that this can change! It also stops parents from always giving a positive affirmation and instead being realistic that their child is struggling and that is OK. Rescuing children from negative emotion stops them from trying new things and persevering when things get tough.

Michael Grose from Parentingideas has also written a good article called *'Don't let lack of confidence and anxiety hold your child back.'* Grose states that parents' modelling confident thinking to children is really important. And he says that reframing negative self-talk by showing them how to find a positive in difficult situations is also very effective.
